

CHIEF JUSTICE'S MESSAGE FOR SPECIALISED FAMILY COURT

The Family Courts continue to contribute significantly to delivering a high standard of

justice in a timely manner. These courts are delivering what is now called therapeutic

justice. The efficient disposal of cases in this jurisdiction accompanied by the necessary

sensitivity is vital to the effectiveness of the Family Courts. The domestic violence

applications are dealt with quickly. Other applications that are vital to the welfare of

children such as maintenance and custody declarations are also addressed speedily so

that the financial support and stability of the home of the child are settled early.

These conclusions are supported by the following: in the reporting period 2,501 new

cases were filed across all the Family Courts and 2,205 were disposed of with a resulting

clearance rate of 90.72%.

Despite this, there are indications that should alert one to the need for vigilance. Of the

seven courts, only one exceeded the forecast clearance rate (Manchester). Hanover

fell by behind the forecast target by 21.14%. St James was 21.97% behind the expected

standard. Further interrogation of these numbers is required to determine the cause or

causes for this significant deviation from expected performance.

Executive Summary

This report provides an analysis of case activity and performance metrics across seven Specialised Family Courts in Jamaica for the second quarter ending June 30, 2024. Key metrics evaluated include case clearance rates, disposal rates, and the courts' overall efficiency in handling various types of cases. The aggregate case clearance rate across all courts was 90.72%, aligning with international benchmarks of 90–110%. The Corporate Area Family Court led with a clearance rate of 103.21%, while Trelawny Family Court posted the lowest at 82.39%.

The key findings of the overall case activity and performance show a total of 2,501 new cases were filed across all courts, with 2,205 disposed cases and 64 inactive cases, resulting in a weighted average case clearance rate of 90.72%, just meeting international standards (90-110%). The Corporate Area Family Court recorded the highest clearance rate of 103.21%, indicating efficient backlog management, followed by the Manchester Family Court at 102.11%.

The Corporate Area Family Court achieved a clearance rate of 95.24% for criminal cases, reflecting strong performance. Courts like Hanover (83.33%) and Trelawny (28.21%) reported lower rates, signalling areas for improvement. Regarding criminal cases, the clearance rates varied significantly, with the Corporate Area Family Court achieving a strong 95.24%, while Trelawny and Westmoreland recorded lower rates at 28.21% and 27.63%, respectively. Key challenges stemmed from high proportions of pending cases in categories such as petty sessions and indictments.

Family matters clearance rates exceeded 100% in many courts, notably Chapelton 110.74% and Manchester 108.76%. Across all courts, maintenance and custody cases dominated the caseload, accounting for over half of new filings.

Weighted clearance rates were highest in Westmoreland 122.58% and Chapelton 110.74%, driven by strong performance in maintenance, custody, and paternity declarations.

Notable efficiency gains were observed in Manchester Family Court's for cases concerning maintenance with a case clearance rate of 116.84%.

Domestic violence filings were significant, with protection orders making up 85% of cases in this category, Corporate Area and Hanover Family Courts recorded clearance rates of over 100%, for domestic violence case activities in the second quarter exceeding the international standards for this metric.

Child Welfare Cases in Chapelton recorded a case clearance rate of 200%, the Trelawny Family Court followed with 150%. The civil case clearance rates exceeded in Hanover, Trelawny, and Westmoreland, also exceeded 100% characteristic of efficiency in handling incoming case volume.

Post disposal activities, including vary orders and disobedience of maintenance cases, were a growing priority, with clearance rates often exceeding 100% indicative of efforts toward backlog reduction. Integrated enforcement and monitoring mechanisms resource allocation and strategic case management are important to efficiency. The variation in court performance underscores the need for targeted interventions, in addressing procedural delays.

A modest improvement in the overall case clearance rate to 94.24% is expected, with significant efficiency gains anticipated in the Corporate Area Family Court (107.83%)., Sustained national progress, however, requires continued focus on courts and case activities that report clearance rates below the international standard, particularly in child welfare and criminal matters.

The above table provides a summary of aggregate case activity across the featured specialised Family Courts in the first quarter of 2024. It shows that a total of 2501 new cases were filed in these courts, while 64 became inactive and 2205 were disposed, leading to an estimated weighted case clearance rate of 90.72%. The Corporate Area Family Court recorded the highest overall weighted case clearance rate among the featured courts with 103.21%, followed by the Manchester Family Court with 102.11%, Chapelton Family Court with 93.43%, while the Westmoreland Family Court recorded a clearance rate of 92.64% and the Trelawny Family Court following behind with 82.39% to round off the top five specialised family courts in the second quarter ended June 30, 2024.

The table presents a comparison of actual and forecasted case clearance rates for The Specialised Family Courts during the quarter 2 calendar period. The analysis includes the deviation between actual and forecasted rates, the squared error, and the absolute percentage error (APE). The Corporate Area Family Court demonstrated a strong performance, achieving an actual clearance rate of 103.21%, slightly below the forecast of 105.50%. This resulted in a deviation of -2.29, a squared error of 5.24, and a low absolute percentage error of 2.22%.

Conversely, several courts recorded considerably low case clearance rates relative to their forecasts. Hanover Family Court's actual clearance rate of 81.96% fell largely short of the 103.10% forecast, yielding a large deviation of -21.14, a squared error of 446.90, and a high absolute percentage error of 25.79%.

St. James Family Court exhibited the largest discrepancy, with an actual rate of 77.53% compared to a forecast of 99.50%, resulting in a deviation of -21.97, the highest squared error of 482.68, and the highest absolute percentage error of 28.34%.

Westmoreland and Trelawny Family Courts also recorded lower actual case clearance rates than forecasted. Westmoreland's actual rate of 92.64% compared to a forecast of 103.35% (deviation: -10.71, squared error: 114.70, APE: 11.56%), while Trelawny's actual rate of 82.39% compared to a forecast of 100.90% (deviation: -18.51, squared error: 342.62, APE: 22.47%).

In contrast to these shortfalls, Manchester Family Court slightly exceeded its forecast. The actual clearance rate of 102.11% surpassed the 98.25% forecast, resulting in a positive deviation of 3.86, a low squared error of 14.90, and a low absolute percentage error of 3.78%.

Chapelton Family Court's actual rate of 93.43% was below its forecast of 101.24%, with a deviation of -7.81, a squared error of 61.00, and an absolute percentage error of 8.36%.

Overall, the total/weighted average clearance rate was 90.72%, below the forecasted 100.45%, representing a deviation of -9.73. The total squared error was 94.67, and the average absolute percentage error was 10.73%. These findings highlight the variation between forecasted and actual performance across the courts.

The above table forecasts core activity for the specialised family courts across the island. The forecasts are generated using the method of exponential smoothing which uses weighted averages from past observations with weights declining exponentially as the observations get older. See further explanation of the mathematical science behind the method of exponential smoothing in the glossary of terms.

The data indicates that the overall forecasted case clearance rate for specialized family courts in the third quarter of 2024 (July–September) is projected to reach 94.24%. This represents an increase of 3.52 percentage points compared to the actual case clearance rate of 90.72% recorded in the second quarter (April–June 2024). Additionally, five family courts are expected to meet or exceed the minimum international standard case clearance rate of 90% during the third quarter. This suggests that these courts are making noteworthy progress in effectively managing their caseloads and moving toward equilibrium.

Introduction

The 2024 Specialised Family Court Statistics Report presents a detailed analysis of case activity and performance for the specialized Family Courts across Jamaica for the period April 1, 2024 - June 30, 2024. This report aims to provide critical insights into the operational efficiency, case management practices, and systemic challenges faced by the courts, with a focus on enhancing judicial processes and improving access to justice. The statistics reflect core performance metrics, including case clearance rates, case disposal rates, and the management of various case types such as criminal matters, family matters, domestic violence cases, and child welfare cases. These metrics not only reflect the courts' efficiency in managing caseloads but also provide valuable insights into their compliance with international benchmarks for case clearance and backlog prevention.

The analysis encompasses key case categories namely: Criminal Matters including indictments, summary matters, and petty sessions; Family Matters covering maintenance, custody, legal guardianship, access, and paternity declarations; Child Welfare Cases focused on child care protection and uncontrollable child matters; Domestic Violence Cases examining protection and occupation orders, Civil Matters, Enforcement and other courtmonitored activities.

The primary objective of the report is to evaluate the courts' adherence to international benchmarks, such as maintaining a case clearance rate of 90-110% and ensuring courtroom utilisation rates that reflect effective resource management. By dissecting key performance indicators, the report seeks to highlight key operational metrics, including the volume and type of cases processed by each court, and compare outcomes against international standards. The report also analyses trends in case types, disposal rates, and the courts' ability to manage both active and pending cases.

The aim is to guide strategic improvements by providing data-driven insights to inform policy and resource allocation, ensuring sustained improvements in court efficiency and service delivery.

Methodology

The report covers the performance of the Corporate Area Family Court, Hanover Family Court, St. James Family Court, Westmoreland Family Court, Trelawny Family Court, Manchester Family Court, and Chapelton Family Court. Case data were categorised by type—criminal, family matters, domestic violence, child welfare, civil, and enforcement activities. The performance metrics are calculated using a weighted average approach, a measure of court performance based on caseload variations. In addition, forecasts are generated using exponential smoothing techniques to predict case activity for the successive quarter. The comparative analysis of forecasts with actual measures using squared error and absolute percentage error provides valuable insights into the accuracy and reliability of forecasting methods, facilitating a more comprehensive assessment of the forecasting model's performance.

Disclaimer

The numbers that are reflected in the case activity summary in the annual report may vary slightly from those quoted in the individual quarterly reports throughout the year due to occasional constraints with timely access to all records and other mitigating factors. Methodological adjustments may also result in slight variations in comparative figures across periods.

Chapter 1.0: The Corporate Area Family Court

This chapter will examine a summary of selected output and performance measurements for matters in the Corporate Area Family Court for the second quarter ended June 30, 2024. It includes analyses of caseload, case type distribution and case clearance rates for the different business lines of the family court.

Case Activity Summary in the Criminal Section (A Division of the Children's Court)

The above table shows the sample of 63 criminal cases filed at the Corporate Area Family Court in the second quarter ended June 30, 2024. Of these, 23 or 36.51% were committal matters, 20 or 31.75% were indictment, 13 or 20.63% were summary matters. There was a total of 52 criminal cases disposed while 8 became inactive during the second quarter ended June 30, 2024. Of these, 23 indictment matters were disposed while 5 became inactive. There were 14 summary matters disposed while 2 became inactive, there were 12 committal matters disposed and 3 petty session matters. This led to an estimated weighted clearance rate of 95.24% for these types of cases which satisfies the international standards on this vital metric.

Case Activity on Child Welfare Matters (A Division of the Children's Court)

This section examines case activity for matters classified as child welfare in the Corporate Area Family Court for the second quarter ended June 30, 2024. Matters falling under child welfare are uncontrollable child and childcare and protection cases.

There were 56 child welfare cases filed at the Corporate Area Family Court in the second quarter ended June 30, 2024, the larger proportion of which were uncontrollable child cases which accounted for 32 or 57.14%, while the remaining proportion were child care protection cases with 24 or 42.86%. A total of 49 child welfare cases were disposed of during the quarter and 1 became inactive. There were 36 child care and protection cases disposed of during the quarter, while 13 uncontrollable child cases were disposed and 1 became inactive. These results led to estimated case clearance rates of 150% for child care and protection cases and 43.75% for uncontrollable child cases, further yielding a weighted average case clearance rate of 89.29%, which is slightly below international standard of 90 and above on this vital metric.

Family Matters Case Activity Summary for The Corporate Area Family Court in the Second Quarter ended June 30, 2024

This section examines case activity for matters classified under the broad category of family matters in the Corporate Area Family Court for the second quarter ended June 30, 2024. Matters falling under this broad case category included in this report are: maintenance, custody, legal guardianship, access, and declaration of paternity.

The 417 new cases filed at the Corporate Area Family Court in the second quarter ended June 30, 2024, revealed that maintenance matters account for the largest proportion of cases filed (with 196 cases, or 47%). This was followed by Custody with 139 or 33.33%. There were 79 Declaration of Paternity cases or 18.94%. A total of 399 cases falling under the broad family category were disposed of or became inactive in the quarter. This is broken down into 382 disposed and 17 inactive cases. Maintenance cases accounted for 188 of the disposed cases and 10 inactive cases while custody accounted for 131 disposed cases and 4 inactive cases. There were 60 disposed declarations of paternity cases while 3 became inactive. This led to an overall estimated weighted average case clearance rate of 95.68% for the broad family case type, led by maintenance with 101.02%, and access cases with 100%, while custody cases accounted for 97.12%.

Summary of Case Activity for Domestic Violence Cases in the Second Quarter ended June 30, 2024, at the Corporate Area Family Court

The below subsection provides a basic summary of case activity for Domestic Violence cases filed at the Family Court in Corporate Area for the second quarter ended June 30, 2024.

The data shows that there was a total of 149 new domestic violence cases filed in the second quarter of 2024 at the Corporate Area Family Court. The larger proportion of which were protection order cases which accounted for 129 or 86.58%, while cases of occupation order with 20 or 13.42% accounted for the remaining proportion. A total of 176 Domestic Violence cases were either disposed or inactive in the quarter. There were 150 protection order cases disposed of during the quarter, while 1 became inactive; 25 occupation order cases were also disposed of in the period. These results led to estimated case clearance rates of 125% for occupation order cases and 117.05% for protection order cases, further yielding a weighted average case clearance rate of 118.12%, which is above international standards on this vital metric.

Apart from substantive case activity, it is important to note that Vary Orders accounted for 101 or 84.87% of post-disposal activity in the Corporate Area Family Court, and the remaining 27 or 15.13% entered the enforcement stage (by way of disobedience of maintenance matters, distress and arrest warrants) during the quarter. A total of 88 vary orders were disposed of or became inactive in the period and 79 enforcements were either disposed of or became inactive, producing a gross case clearance rate of 140.34% for these matters.

This chapter will examine a summary of selected output and performance measurements for matters in the St. James Family Court for the second quarter ended June 30, 2024. Such will involve analyses of caseload, case type distribution and case clearance rates for the different business lines of the family court.

The above table shows the sample of 31 criminal cases filed at the St. James Family Court in the second quarter ended June 30, 2024. Of these, 14 or 45.16% were summary matters. Indictment matters accounted for 9 or 29.03%, while petty session matters accounted for 5 or 16.12%. The remaining 3 or 9.67% was accounted for by committal cases. There was a total of 15 criminal cases disposed of during the second quarter ended June 30, 2024. It is important to note that, apart from substantive case activity, vary orders accounted for 20 or 28.57% of post disposal activities in the Trelawny Family Court and the remaining 50 or 71.43% entered the enforcement stage (by way of disobedience of maintenance matters, distress, and arrest warrants) during the quarter. There were 21 vary orders disposed, while 30 enforcements were disposed or became inactive in the period, producing a gross case clearance rate of 104.29% on these matters.

Chapter 6.0: The Manchester Family Court

This chapter will examine a summary of selected output and performance measurements for matters in the Manchester Family Court for the second quarter ended June 30, 2024. Such will involve analyses of caseload, case type distribution and case clearance rates for the different business lines of the family court.

Case Activity Summary in the Criminal Section (A Division of the Children's Court)

The above table shows the sample of 22 criminal cases filed at the Manchester Family Court in the second quarter ended June 30, 2024. Summary matters accounted for 16 cases files or 72.73%, while committal cases accounted for the remaining 6 new cases filed or 27.27%. There was a total of 16 criminal cases disposed of or became inactive during second quarter ended June 30, 2024, summary matters accounted for 14 disposed matters while committal cases accounted for 1 case. This produced an estimated weighted case clearance rate of 72.73% for matters classified as criminal in the Manchester Family Court.

Case Activity on Child Welfare Matters (A Division of the Children's Court)

This section examines case activity for matters classified as child welfare in the Manchester Family Court for the second quarter ended June 30, 2024. Matters falling under child welfare are uncontrollable child and childcare and protection cases.

There were 10 new child welfare cases filed at the Manchester Family Court in the second quarter ended June 30, 2024, the larger proportion of which were uncontrollable child cases, accounted for 6 or 60%, while cases classified as child care protection accounted for the remaining proportion, 4 or 40%. A total of 8 child welfare cases were disposed of or became inactive during the quarter. There were 6 uncontrollable child cases disposed of during the quarter, while 2 matters became inactive. These results produced estimated case clearance rates of 133.33% for uncontrollable child cases, further yielding a weighted average case clearance rate of 80%, which does not satisfy international standards on this vital metric.

Family Matters Case Activity Summary for the Manchester Family Court in the Second Quarter ended June 30, 2024

This section examines case activity for matters classified under the broad category of family matters in the Manchester Family Court for the second quarter ended June 30, 2024. Matters falling under this broad case category included in this report are, maintenance, custody, legal guardianship, access, and declaration of paternity.

The 137 new cases filed at the Manchester Family Court in the second quarter ended June 30, 2024, showed that maintenance matters accounted for the largest proportion of cases filed with 95 cases or 69.34%; access matters followed with 22 or 16.06% of new cases filed. There were also 17 matters of custody, 2 matters of declaration of paternity and 1 adoption cases filed in the report period. A total of 149 cases falling under this broad family category were disposed of in the quarter. Maintenance cases accounted for 111 of the disposed cases while custody cases accounted for 20 disposed cases. There were, 13 disposed cases related to access and 4 disposed declaration of paternity cases. This produced an overall estimated weighted average case clearance rate of 108.76% for the broad family case type. Declaration of paternity recorded the highest clearance rate of 200% despite its low absolute numbers. Custody cases followed with 117.65%. Maintenance matters with 116.84% was next, adoption with 100%, and access with 59.09%.

Summary of Case Activity for Domestic Violence Cases in the Second Quarter ended June 30, 2024, at the Manchester Family Court

The below subsection provides a basic summary of case activity for Domestic Violence cases filed at the Family Court in Manchester for the second quarter ended June 30, 2024.

The data above shows that there was a total of 21 new domestic violence cases filed in the first quarter of 2024 at the Manchester Family Court. Protection order accounted for 20 or 95.23%, while the remaining 1 or 4.76% was accounted for by occupation order. A total 21 Domestic Violence cases were disposed of during the quarter of which protection order cases accounted for 20 while occupation order recorded 1 disposed case. These outputs produced an overall clearance rate of 100% which satisfies international standards on this vital metric.

It is important to note that, apart from substantive case activity, vary orders accounted for 36 or 35.29% of post disposal activities in the Manchester family court and the remaining 66 or 64.71% entered the enforcement stage (by way of disobedience of maintenance matters, distress and arrest warrants) during the quarter in the Manchester Family Court. In the report period 23 vary orders were disposed and 44 enforcement matters were disposed or became inactive, this produced a case clearance rate of 65.69% for these matters.

Chapter 7.0: The Chapelton Family Court

This chapter will examine a summary of selected output and performance measurements for matters in the Chapelton Family Court for the second quarter ended June 30, 2024. It includes analyses of caseloads, case type distribution, and case clearance rates across the various business lines of the family court.

Case Activity Summary in the Criminal Section (A Division of the Children's Court)

The above table shows the sample of 38 criminal cases filed at the Chapelton Family Court in the second quarter ended June 30, 2024. Of these, 20 or 52.63% were indictment matters and 18 or 47.37% were summary matters. There was a total of 16 matters disposed during the quarter with indictments matters accounting for 15 or 93.75%, while the remaining 6.25% was accounted for by summary matters. This produced an estimated weighted case clearance rate of 42.11% for criminal cases in the Chapelton Family Court.

There were 9 child welfare cases filed at the Chapelton Family Court in the second quarter ended June 30, 2024. Of these 5 or 55.55% were cases of uncontrollable child cases and the remaining 4 or 44.44% were child care protection cases. A total of 18 child welfare cases were disposed of in the quarter, with child care protection cases accounting for 11 or 61.11% of the total. The remaining 7 or 38.88% was accounted for by uncontrollable child cases. This yielded a weighted average case clearance rate of 200%, which satisfies international standards on this vital metric.

Family Matters Case Activity Summary for the Chapelton Family Court in the Second Quarter ended June 30, 2024

This section examines case activity for matters classified under the broad category of family matters in the Chapelton Family Court for the second quarter ended June 30, 2024. Matters falling under this broad case category included in this report are, maintenance, custody, legal guardianship, access, and declaration of paternity.

The 121 new cases filed at the Chapelton Family Court in the second quarter ended June 30, 2024, showed that the largest proportion of cases filed were maintenance matters with 81 cases or 66.94%. This was followed by custody cases with 21 or 17.36% and access which accounted for 11 cases filed or 9.09%. Additionally, there were 4 declaration of paternity cases, 3 adoption case and 1 legal guardianship case filed in the quarter. A total of 134 cases falling under this broad family category were disposed of during the report period. Of the total cases disposed 81 were maintenance cases, 27 custody cases 14 access cases, 9 declaration of paternity cases and 2 adoption cases and 1 legal guardianship case. During the report period no case became inactive. This produced an overall estimated weighted average case clearance rate of 110.74% for the broad family case type. Declaration of paternity cases recorded the highest case clearance rates of 225%, followed by custody and access cases recording a case clearance rate of 128.57% and 127.27%, respectively. Matters concerning maintenance had a case clearance rate of 100% and legal guardianship cases also with 100% for the second quarter of the 2024 calendar year.

Summary of Case Activity for Domestic Violence Cases in the Second Quarter ended June 30, 2024, at the Chapelton Family Court

The below subsection provides a basic summary of case activity for Domestic Violence cases filed at the Family Court in Clarendon for the second quarter ended June 30, 2024.

Table 7.4 shows that there was a total of 26 new domestic violence cases filed in the second quarter of 2024 at the Chapelton Family Court. Protection orders accounted for 24 or 92.31% of the cases while occupation order accounted for the remaining 2 or 7.69%. A total of 15 domestic cases were disposed of or became inactive during the quarter; 13 of the matters disposed were protection orders, the remaining 1 matter disposed of were occupation orders. This output produced a weighted average case clearance rate of 57.69%, which does not satisfy international standards on this vital metric.

The data above shows that there was a total of 4 new civil cases filed in the second quarter ended June 30, 2024. A total of 2 civil cases which were disposed of in the quarter, this produced an estimated case clearance rate of 50%, which does not satisfy international standards on this metric.

It is important to note that, apart from substantive case activity vary orders accounted for 14 or 32.56% of post disposal activities in the Chapelton family court and the remaining 29 or 67.44% entered the enforcement stage (by way of disobedience of maintenance matters) and vary orders during the quarter. In the quarter 40 vary orders became inactive, 4 enforcements also became inactive, which produced a case clearance rate of 102.33%.

Conclusion

The 2024 Specialized Family Court Statistics Report for the second quarter highlights the significant progress made by Jamaica's Specialized Family Courts in addressing the needs of families and children, while also identifying areas that require continued focus and improvement. With a total of 2,501 new cases filed and an overall weighted clearance rate of 90.72%, the courts are approaching international benchmarks, reflecting steady progress in case management and operational efficiency.

The Corporate Area Family Court recorded the highest clearance rate at 103.21%, followed by Manchester Family Court at 102.11%. These results demonstrate the courts capacity to manage their caseloads effectively and even reduce backlogs. Courts such as Westmoreland 92.64% and Chapelton 93.43% also exceeded the minimum international standard of 90%, a demonstration of their facility to deliver timely justice. St. James Family Court 77.53% and Hanover Family Court 81.96% fell below the minimum international standard for case clearance rate, particularly in case activities concerning child welfare and domestic violence cases.

Disparities in performance by case type indicate a need for specialized interventions, including improved resources and training in managing criminal and child welfare cases. Domestic violence filings remain a pressing concern, with protection orders accounting for a sizeable proportion of new cases. While some courts, like Corporate Area and Hanover, excelled with clearance rates exceeding 100%, others, including Chapelton 57.69%, struggled to meet standards.

Child welfare cases show variability in outcomes, with some courts achieving clearance rates well above 100% e.g., Chapelton at 200% and others falling short e.g., Hanover at 32.50%. Family matters, including maintenance and custody, were well-managed, with clearance rates exceeding international benchmarks in many courts.

Courts with persistently low clearance rates, such as St. James and Hanover, require targeted investments in personnel, training, and courtroom resources. Emphasising enforcement mechanisms, especially in maintenance and domestic violence cases, can improve compliance and case resolution rates. Enhanced case tracking and digital file management systems are critical to reducing procedural delays and ensuring timely access to case files. With regards to training and public engagement, continuous professional development for court staff is essential, particularly in handling complex case types like child welfare and domestic violence. Public education campaigns about the availability and importance of family court services can encourage timely filings and resolution of disputes. There should also be regular performance audits and adherence to international standards, to ensure that courts remain accountable and focused on reducing backlogs.

Forecasts predict an improvement in overall performance, with a weighted average clearance rate of 94.24%, reflecting anticipated gains in efficiency. However, achieving long-term success will depend on addressing systemic challenges and maintaining gains in efficiencies in areas of high-performance.

The report provides valuable insights into the current state of Jamaica's Specialised Family Courts. Noting both strengths and areas for growth, the report serves to support improving strategies and effective targeted resource allocation. With sustained focus and collaborative efforts, Jamaica's Specialised Family Courts are on the path to achieve greater efficiencies in timely and equitable justice for all.

Glossary of Terms

Sampling Distribution: A sampling distribution of a given population is the distribution of frequencies of a range of outcomes that could possibly occur for a statistic of a population. A population is the entire pool from which a statistical sample is drawn.

Range: This is a measure of the spread of values in a data set, calculated as the highest minus the lowest value. A larger range score may indicate a higher spread of values in a data set.

Standard deviation: This is a measure of how widely spread the scores in a data set are around the average value of that data set. The higher the standard deviation, the higher the variation of the raw scores in the data set, from the average score. A low standard deviation is an indication that the scores in a data set are clustered around the average.

Outlier: An outlier is a value that is too small or too large, relative to the majority of scores/trend in a data set.

Skewness: This is measure of the distribution of scores in a data set. It gives an idea of where the larger proportion of the scores in a data set can be found. Generally, if skewness is positive as revealed by a positive value for this measure, this suggests that a greater proportion of the scores in the data set are at the lower end. If the skewness is negative as revealed by a negative value for this measure, it generally suggests that a greater proportion of the scores are at the higher end. If the skewness measure is approximately 0, then there is roughly equal distribution of scores on both the higher and lower ends of the average figure.

Clearance rate: The ratio on incoming to outgoing cases or of new cases filed to cases disposed, regardless of when the disposed cases originated. For example, in a given Term 100 new cases were filed and 110 were disposed (including cases originating before that Term) the clearance rate is 110/100 or 110%.

Note: The clearance rate could therefore exceed 100% but the disposal rate has a maximum value of 100%. A persistent case clearance rate of less than 100% will eventually lead to a backlog of cases in the court system. The inferred international benchmark for case clearance rates is an average of 90% - 110% annualised. This is a critical foundation to backlog prevention in the court system.

Disposal rate: As distinct from clearance rate, the disposal rate is the proportion of new cases filed which have been disposed in a particular period. For example, if 100 new cases are filed in a particular Term and 80 of those cases were disposed in said Term, then the disposal rate is 80%.

Note: A persistent case clearance rate of less than 100% will eventually lead to a backlog of cases in the court system.

Case congestion rate: The ratio of pending cases to cases disposed in a given period. It is an indication of how fatigued a court is, given the existing state of resources and degree of efficiency. A case congestion rate of 150% for example, is an indication that given the resources currently at a court's disposal and its degree of efficiency, it is carrying 1.5 times its capacity.

Trial/hearing date certainty: This is the proportion of dates set for trial or hearing which proceed without adjournment. For example, if 100 trial dates are set in a particular Term and 40 are adjourned, then the trial certainty rate would be 60%. The international standard for this measure is between 92% and 100%.

Case File Integrity Rate: Measures the proportion of time that a case file is fully ready and available in a timely manner for a matter to proceed. Hence, any adjournment, which is due to the lack of readiness of a case file or related proceedings for court at the scheduled time,

impairs the case file integrity rate. The international benchmark for the case file integrity is 100%.

Courtroom utilisation rate: The proportion of courtrooms in full use on a daily basis or the proportion of hours utilised in a courtroom on a daily basis. The international standard for this rate is 100%.

Case backlog: A case that is in the court system for more than two years without disposition.

The **gross backlog rate** measures the proportion of all cases filed within a given period which remain unresolved for a period of over two years.

The **net backlog rate** on the other hand measures the proportion of active cases filed in a given period which are unresolved for over two years.

Continuance and Adjournment: In a general sense, any delay in the progression of a hearing in which a future date/time is set or anticipated for continuation is a form of adjournment. However, in order to make a strict distinction between matters which are adjourned for procedural factors and those which are generally avoidable, court statistics utilises the terms 'continuance' and 'adjournment.' Here, 'continuance' is used strictly to describe situations in which future dates are set due to procedural reasons and 'adjournments' is used to describe the circumstances in which future dates of appearance are set due to generally avoidable reasons. For example, adjournments for another stage of hearing, say from a plea and case management hearing to a trial hearing or from the last date of trial to a sentencing date are classified as 'continuance' but delays for say, missing or incomplete files, due to outstanding medical reports or attorney absenteeism are classified as 'adjournments'. Adjournments as defined in this document have an adverse effect on hearing date certainty rates, but continuances do not.

Percentile Rank: This refers to the percentage of scores that are equal to or less than a given score. Percentile ranks, like percentages, fall on a continuum from 0 to 100. For example, a percentile ranks of 45 indicates that 45% of the scores in a distribution of scores fall at or below the score at the 35th percentile. Percentile ranks are useful when you want to quickly understand how a particular score compares to the other scores in a distribution of scores. For instance, knowing a court disposed 300 cases in a given period doesn't tell you much. You don't know how many case disposals were possible, and even if you did, you wouldn't know how that court's score compared to the rest of the courts. If, however, you were told that the court scored at the 80th percentile, then you would know that this court did as well or better than 80% of the courts in case disposals.

Difference between percentage and percentile changes: The difference between percentage and percentage points, the latter is strictly used to compare two percentages, for example, if the clearance rate in 2018 was 89% and the clearance rate in 2019 is 100%, then the appropriate expression to compare these would be "an 11 percentage points increase". However, if we are comparing two absolute numbers, say, 1000 cases were disposed in 2018, and 1500 in 2019, then there would be a 50% increase in cases disposed.

Weighted Average: Weighted average is a calculation that takes into account the varying degrees of significance of the groups or numbers in a data set. In calculating a weighted average for a particular variable, the individual scores or averages for each group are multiplied by the weight or number of observations in each of those groups and summed. The outcome is then divided by the summation of the number of observations in all groups combined. For example, if we wish to calculate the weighted average clearance rate for the parish courts, the product of the clearance rate and number of cases for each court are computed, added, and then divided by the total number of cases across all the parish courts. This means that a court with a larger caseload has a greater impact on the case clearance

rate than a smaller court. A weighted average can be more accurate than a simple average in which all numbers in a data set are assigned an identical weight.

Exponential Smoothing: Exponential smoothing of time series data assigns exponentially decreasing weights for newest to oldest observations. In other words, the older data, the less priority ("weight") the data is given; newer data is seen as more relevant and is assigned more weight. Smoothing parameters (smoothing constants) – usually denoted by a- determine the weights of the observations.

Exponential smoothing is usually used to make short term forecasts, as longer-term forecasts using this technique can be quite unreliable.

- Simple (single) exponential smoothing uses a weighted moving average with exponentially decreasing weights.
- Holt's trend-corrected double exponential smoothing is usually more reliable for handling data that shows trends, compared to the single procedure.
- Triple exponential smoothing (also called the Multiplicative Holt-Winters) is usually
 more reliable for parabolic trends or data that shows trends and seasonality.
